California State University, Northridge prepares this report in compliance with California State Education Code, Chapter 15.5, of the Donahoe Higher Education Act, Section 67380.

California State University, Northridge (also known as CSUN) is a public university located in the Northridge neighborhood of Los Angeles, California, in the San Fernando Valley. The 356-acre campus is home to 36,960 (Fall 2025) students, including 3,293 on-campus residents, as well as 4,130 faculty, staff and administrators. CSUN remains committed to the safety of our campus community, educational and professional goals of its students, as well as its extensive service to the community.

AVAILABILITY, LOCATION, AND METHODS TO SUMMON LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE

The CSUN Department of Police Services employs twenty-one (21) highly-trained, full-time, sworn police officers, seven (7) 911 Public Safety Answering Point Dispatchers, six (6) Community Service Officers, eleven (11) part-time Matador Patrol student employees, and an active support staff for the 24-hour protection of the CSUN campus community. The Department is located on the CSUN campus at 9222 Darby Avenue on the southeast corner of Darby Avenue and Prairie Street.

California State University peace officers have state-wide police authority and jurisdiction per Penal Code 830.2(c) and Education Code 89560, and are vested with law enforcement powers and responsibilities, identical to the local police or sheriff departments in your home community.

The Department of Police Services maintains close working relationships with all local, county, state and federal public safety agencies through partnerships and mutual aid agreements. Memorandums of Agreement (MOA) for law enforcement assistance have been established with the Los Angeles Police Department, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office, Los Angeles Unified School District Police Department, and the University of California Police Department.

To Report a Crime, Suspicious Circumstances, or an Emergency

Call the CSUN police at 818-677-2111. In the event of an emergency, dial 9-1-1 or use a campus blue light emergency phone, or text to 9-1-1

- Give your name, telephone number, and location.
- Give clear and accurate information.
- Be prepared to supply suspect and vehicle description, and direction of travel.
- DON'T HANG UP! Follow the instructions of the dispatcher.

SPECIAL SAFEGUARDS FOR FACILITIES OR ACTIVITIES**Security of and Access to Campus Facilities**

All campus facilities are key-accessed, and most are open daily for scheduled campus community use. Facilities within the University Park Residential Life Complex are controlled via key-card access with a secure gated security program operating from 7:00pm to 3:00am seven days a week. Campus key control and distribution are functions of the Physical Plant lock shop, while key access control for the residential complex rests with the Residential Life administrative office. To provide for the security of campus facilities, the University Police enforces Educational Code 89031 & Residential Life housing policies. Campus facility access may be revoked per Penal Code 626.

Security Considerations Used in Maintenance of Campus Facilities

The Department of Physical Plant Management is responsible for security of all campus facilities. Personnel perform daily building lock-up and monitor all maintenance issues in campus lighting, door locks and general environmental safety in conjunction with the Department of Police Services. An annual inspection and survey of campus indoor/outdoor lighting, shrubbery and walkways is conducted, with the Department of Police Services providing security surveys upon request or when a need is observed. The University participates in Crime Prevention through Environmental Design concepts for planning and improvements on campus.

Campus CCTV System

The campus has a closed-circuit television (CCTV) system to further enhance the safety and security in public areas of the campus. This technology can alert to potential criminal activity and also deter potential offenders who recognize the elevated risk of apprehension from such a system in that the information they provide is extremely valuable in capturing criminal activity and helping identify suspects.

This technology provides value before, during, and after criminal activity. The general knowledge within the campus community of the existence of the CCTV system serves to deter some from engaging in criminal or illicit behavior. Because of random monitoring and alerting features, the system often provides a means for law enforcement to intervene in ongoing criminal activity. Lastly, the recording of video feed is often found to provide critical forensic information aiding criminal investigations.

Emergency Blue Light Call Stations

A 9-1-1 24-hour, button activated, emergency telephone system will put you in contact with a police dispatcher for any emergency need. There are 116 call stations located throughout the CSUN campus, including residential housing. Four of the stations are yellow in color, these are TTY call boxes designed for the deaf and hard of hearing community. They are equipped with a small keyboard that enables the caller to type messages directly to University Police Dispatch. The police dispatcher can send a message to the caller by either typing or using a computer to choose pre-selected emergency responses. Crime Prevention Programs

Special Event Safety Planning

Preparation for large events on campus involve the creation of Incident Action Plans according to the Standardized Emergency Management System and in collaboration with mutual aid agencies and contracted safety personnel.

ACTIONS TAKEN IN THE PRECEDING 18 MONTHS TO INCREASE SAFETY

- CSUN Safe App launched – Included features Friend Walk – Send your live location to a friend to monitor your safety until you reach your destination, Mobile Bluelight – sends your location to DPS in real time during an emergency can connect you with dispatch, We Tip – Anonymously report suspicious activity, prior criminal activity, or any safety concerns, a Campus Map, Emergency Procedures – incident response strategies to keep safe during a disaster or crisis while on campus, Support Resources – assist students in finding help that promotes their success at CSUN.
- Updated hate crime website information consistent with the California Department of Justice language, included their brochure and the Los Angeles District Attorneys hate crime brochure.
- 39 new CCTV cameras were added to new and existing buildings and 29 cameras were upgraded with 8 to multi-image cameras throughout the campus.
- The campus continues to upgrade building exterior locks using the Sargent Assa Abloy electronic door locking system to transition away from physical keys. This conversion allows for system access changes and building security when keys are lost or stolen, as the locks are controlled by the PERSONA software system. The upgrade has been completed in 12 campus buildings, and 12 are currently being upgraded.
- PPM and Student Housing has replaced 3,200 outmoded Housing door locks and Housing now has a partitioned database of their users for PERSONA.
- The campus continues the upgrade from the now-obsolete Omni Locking system to a new campus standard, using the Sargent Assa Abloy electronic door locking system and PERSONA Campus Online door scheduling and credential management software. Replacing legacy Omni locks enables a more rapid response when access needs to change, such as when a person's code is compromised, or a keycard is lost or stolen. There are approximately 210 remaining Omni locks to be upgraded in rooms and offices around campus.
- Upgrades to panic alarms in various campus buildings and installation in new campus buildings.

- Continued implementation of the Active Shooter Survival Escape Response Training program (ASSERT) offered to the campus community.
- Completed testing of buildings equipped with the AmberBox gunshot detection system.
- Evening Campus Safety Walk

CHANGES IN SAFETY PRECAUTIONS EXPECTED TO BE MADE DURING THE NEXT 24 MONTHS

- Continued expansion of the campus CCTV system and the replacement of a select number of cameras to new multi-image cameras.
- Current planning is to complete exterior door access for 3 buildings in the next 6 months followed by 9 other buildings in the next 18 months. The exterior door automation project is estimated to be completed by 2028. Omni lock replacement is being coordinated as budget and staffing allows.
- Installation of gunshot detection technology in new campus buildings and integration into the campus CCTV system.
- Continued upgrades and additions to panic alarms in various campus buildings and new campus buildings.

RECORDS OF ON-CAMPUS CRIME

California Education Code 67380(a)(1)(A)

California State University campuses are required by California Education Code 67380(a)(1)(A) to compile records of all occurrences reported to campus police, campus security personnel, or campus safety authorities of, and arrests for, crimes that are committed on campus and that involve violence, hate violence, theft, destruction of property, illegal drugs, or alcohol intoxication, and to make this information available within two business days if requested by students, prospective students, employees, or the media.
